## 1. Policy Statement

Wolviston Primary School offers a positive, safe learning environment for its community, in which everyone has equal and individual recognition and respect. We celebrate success and are committed to the continuous improvement and fulfilment of potential in every child. We encourage increasing independence and self-discipline amongst the pupils. Everyone within the school has an important role to play in sharing responsibility for the development of positive behaviour and attitudes.

## 2. Aims

At Wolviston Primary, we have high aspirations and ambitions for all our children and we believe that no child should be left behind. We strongly believe that it is not about where the children start from but their passion and thirst for knowledge, and their dedication and commitment to learning that make the difference between success and failure. We are determined to ensure that our children aregiven every chance to realise their full potential. Although our Pupil Premium funding represents a small proportion of our budget, this policy outlines how we will ensure it is spent to maximum effect.

## 3. Background

The Pupil Premium is a government initiative that targets extra money at pupils from deprived backgrounds. Research shows that pupils from deprived backgrounds underachieve compared to their non-deprived peers. The premium is provided to enable these pupils to be supported to reach their potential.

The Government has used pupils entitled to free school meals (FSM), looked after children and service children as indicators of deprivation, and have provided a fixed amount of money for schools per pupil based on the number of pupils registered for FSM over a rolling six-year period. This fixed amount of money is expected to increase every year for the course of this current Parliament. At Wolviston Primary we will be using the indicator of those eligible for FSM as well as identified vulnerable groups as our target children to 'diminish the difference' regarding attainment.

## 4. Context

When making decisions about using Pupil Premium funding it is important to consider the context of the school and the subsequent challenges faced. Common barriers for FSM children can be less support at home, weak language and communication skills, lack of confidence, more frequent behaviour difficulties, and attendance and punctuality issues. There may also be complex family situations that prevent children from flourishing. The challenges are varied and there is no "one size fits all".

# 5. Key Principles

By following the key principles below, we believe we can maximise the impact of our Pupil Premium spending.

## **Building Belief**

We will provide a culture where:

- staff believe in ALL children
- there are "no excuses" made for underperformance
- staff adopt a "solution-focused" approach to overcoming barriers
- staff support children to develop "growth" mind sets towards learning

## **Analysing Data**

We will ensure that:

- All staff are involved in the analysis of data so that they are fully aware of strengths and weaknesses across the school
- We use research to support us in determining the strategies that will be most effective

# **Identification of Pupils**

We will ensure that:

- ALL teaching staff and support staff are involved in the analysis of data and identification of
- pupils
- ALL staff are aware of who Pupil Premium and vulnerable children are
- ALL Pupil Premium children benefit from the funding, not just those who are underperforming
- Underachievement at all levels is targeted (not just lower attaining pupils)
- Children's individual needs are considered carefully so that we provide support for those children who could be doing "even better if....."

# **Improving Day to Day Teaching**

We will continue to ensure that **all** children across the school receive good teaching, with increasing percentages of outstanding teaching achieved by using our team leaders to:

- Set high expectations
- Address any within-school variance
- Ensure consistent implementation of the non-negotiables, e.g. marking and guided reading
- Share good practice within the school and draw on external expertise
- Provide high quality CPD
- Improve assessment through joint levelling and moderation

## <u>Increasing learning time</u>

We will maximise the time children have to "close the gap" through:

- Improving attendance and punctuality
- Providing earlier intervention
- Extended learning out of school hours

#### Individualising support

We will ensure that the additional support we provide is effective by:

- Looking at the individual needs of each child and identifying their barriers to learning
- Ensuring additional support staff and class teachers communicate regularly
- Using phase leaders to provide high quality interventions across their phases
- Matching the skills of the support staff to the interventions they provide
- Working with other agencies to bring in additional expertise
- Tailoring interventions to the needs of the child
- Recognising and build on children's strengths to further boost confidence
- Providing support for parents
  - to support their children's learning within the curriculum
  - to develop their own skills
  - to manage in times of crisis

# Going the Extra Mile

In our determination to ensure that ALL children succeed we recognise the need for and are committed to providing completely individualised interventions for set periods of time to support children in times of crisis.

# **6. Monitoring and Evaluation**

We will ensure that:

- A wide range of data is used achievement data, pupils' work, observations, learning
- walks, case studies, and staff, parent and pupil voice
- Assessment Data is collected half termly so that the impact of interventions can be
- monitored regularly
- Assessments are closely moderated to ensure they are accurate
- Teaching staff attend and contribute to pupil progress dialogues each half term
- Identification of children is reviewed half termly
- Regular feedback about performance is given to children and parents
- Interventions are adapted or changed if they are not working
- Case studies are used to evaluate the impact of pastoral interventions, such as attendance and behaviour
- A designated member of the SLT maintains an overview of Pupil Premium spending
- A governor is given responsibility for Pupil Premium

## 7. Reporting

When reporting about Pupil Premium funding we will include:

- contextual information of the school
- analysis of data
- total Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) received
- total PPG spent
- a summary of the impact of PPG
- objectives for the year
- use of research
- reasons for decision making
- performance of disadvantaged pupils (compared to non-Pupil Premium children)
- implications for Pupil Premium spending the following year
- nature of support and allocation
- social, emotional and behavioural issues
- enrichment beyond the curriculum

Where relevant we may include further information:

- other evidence of impact e.g. Ofsted, Accreditations
- case studies (pastoral support, individualised interventions)
- curriculum information
- an overview of additional spending

The Governing Body will consider the information provided and will ensure that there is an annual statement to the parents on the school website outlining how the Pupil Premium funding has been used to address the issue of closing the gap for pupils eligible for Pupil Premium. This task will be carried out in line with the requirements published by the Department for Education.
